## **Secretary Azar Announces Extension of Public Health Emergency**

HHS Secretary Alex Azar announced on Thursday, July 23 that he is <u>renewing the determination of the public health emergency</u>, <u>effective for 90 days starting July 25</u>. As a result of the continued consequences of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, on this date and after consultation with public health officials as necessary, I, Alex M. Azar II, Secretary of Health and Human Services, pursuant to the authority vested in me under section 319 of the Public Health Service Act, do hereby renew, effective July 25, 2020, my January 31, 2020, determination that I previously renewed on April 21, 2020, that a public health emergency exists and has existed since January 27, 2020, nationwide.

#### What does this mean for 1135 waivers?

The most recently published <u>list of 1135 waivers (6/25/2020</u>), including those for hospice, remain in effect. Most notable is that the suspension of TPE and other audits has been removed from the 1135 waiver list. TPE and other audits will begin again, regardless of the public health emergency, on August 3, 2020.
