Congressional Briefing on the Value of Hospice

Earlier today, NHPCO, the National Association for Home Health and Hospice Care (NAHC), and NORC at the University of Chicago presented key findings from the Value of Hospice in Medicare study on Capitol Hill to congressional staff. The findings from the study, published in March of this year, show that patients' use of hospice care contributed to \$3.5 billion in savings for Medicare in 2019, while providing multiple benefits to patients, families, and caregivers.

CMS CY 2024 Home Health Proposed Rule – NHPCO & NAHC Combined Listening Session

On Friday, August 4 from 1-2 p.m. ET, NHPCO and NAHC will be hosting a joint listening session for members to provide feedback on the Calendar Year (CY) 2024 Home Health Prospective Payment System Rate Update and Quality Reporting Program Requirements proposed rule. The goal of the listening session will be to hear from providers on the potential impacts of the proposed rule, so come with comments and questions. Please <u>register for the event</u>. The proposed rule includes the implementation of the hospice information dispute resolution (IDR) and Special Focus Program along with new provider enrollment provisions. For a full analysis of the proposed rule, NHPCO issued <u>a regulatory alert on July 5</u>.

REGULATORY & COMPLIANCE

OCR Enforcement Discretion for HIPAA Telehealth Compliance Ending

On April 11, 2023, the HHS Office of Civil Rights (OCR) issued a "<u>Notification of Enforcement</u> <u>Discretion</u>" that provides "a transition period for health care providers using telehealth to make any changes to their operations that are needed to provide telehealth in a private and secure manner to be in compliance with the HIPAA Rules." This discretion will end on August 9, 2023. <u>Providers must have HIPAA compliant telehealth implemented by this date</u>. For more information, see <u>NHPCO's regulatory alert</u>.

Revised Form I-9 Available

On August 1, 2023, a new Employment Eligibility Verification, Form I-9, will be available on the <u>U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services official website</u>. The new form is designed to be fillable and shorter in length while still allowing standalone supplemental sections for specific situations and allows verification for remote examination of documentation. All employers must use the update form by November 1, 2023. These updates come along with the <u>sunsetting of COVID-19</u> <u>flexibilities</u> on July 31, 2023.

CMS Issues CY 2024 Physician Fee Schedule Proposed Rule

On July 13, CMS posted the <u>Calendar Year (CY) 2024 Physician Fee Schedule proposed rule</u> for public inspection to the Federal Register. This proposed rule implements the provisions in the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, adding marriage and family therapists, or mental health counselors, as members of the hospice interdisciplinary team. NHPCO will begin preparing formal comments and welcomes thoughts, input, and suggestions during this process. Comments are due on **September 11, 2023**.

Measures of Excellence (MOE) – Q2 Data Submission

MOE data for the second quarter, April through June 2023, is due on Friday, July 28. Please reach out to <u>moe@nhpco.org</u> with any questions. The <u>Measures of Excellence (MOE)</u> is a quarterly data collection tool and dashboard that organizations may use to track operational and clinical data to inform high quality care. The quarterly MOE Dashboard allows organizations to compare themselves to others for benchmarking and the MOE National Report provides data that supports a comprehensive review of national participant performance. The MOE Dashboard and National Report are exclusive NHPCO member benefits.

The National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK) conducts and supports research on many chronic conditions which disproportionately affect minority populations. The Health Disparities and Health Equity Research Working Group of the NIDDK Advisory Council has released a new report, <u>Pathways to Health for All</u>, that outlines recommendations for advancing health equity and reducing health disparities in NIDDK's research programs.
