...provide non-medical, individualized, holistic support and companionship to the dying individual and their family from initial diagnosis through bereavement.

Scope of Practice (nedalliance.org)

- Inform, support, guide, accompany
- Provide resources
- Collaborate with other care providers
- Respect values and autonomy, foster selfdetermination
- Non-clinical, non-medical



Doulas & the IDT

- Role is not to replace the current disciplines of the IDT but to enhance
 - The goal is to positively impact all departments of the hospice agency

How Doulas can support:

- Reinforce palliative care concepts & plan of care
- Assist with advance care planning
- Life review
- Vigil planning
- Respite
- Bereavement

Integration Options

- Volunteer
- Contracted
- Hired/Salaried
- Per Diem/On Call
- Community Doulas (not affiliated with hospice or palliative care)

Benefits of a Volunteer Doula

- Part of your agency
- Cost Effective
- Increased Skill Level
- Contributes to your 5% direct hours regulation
- Community Involvement



Benefits of Contracted Doula

- Flexibility with schedule
- Ability to sit longer
- Assist with on-call presence
- Livelihood/Career
- Focus more on care and not on documentation


